

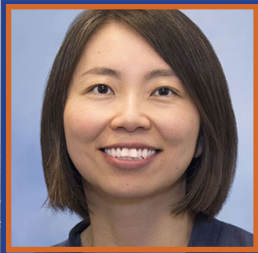

SYMPOSIUM I: Telehealth Delivery of Opioid Use Disorder Treatment in the Age of Covid-19

SUMMARY: Patients with opioid and other substance use disorders are particularly vulnerable to consequences from loss of care that can occur if necessary treatments and psychosocial services are disrupted by COVID-19. The rapid and unprecedented expansion of telehealth in response to COVID-19 is likely to leave a permanent mark on how OUD care is delivered well after resolution of the COVID-19 pandemic. SYMPOSIUM II: Addressing the Re-Emerging Methamphetamine Use Challenge: New Research Findings and Clinical Implications

SUMMARY: According to the National Survey on Drug Use and Health (NSDUH) in 2018, an estimated 1,867,000 (or 0.7%) of persons in US aged 12 years and older, reported methamphetamine use in the past year and 1,051,000 or 0.4% reported substance use disorder in the past year involving methamphetamines. Western regions consistently experience the highest rates of methamphetamine use and overdose, with recent reports from law enforcement agencies of increased methamphetamine potency as well as availability dispersing to other parts of the US. SYMPOSIUM IV: Interactive Effects of Chronic Stress and Sleep Disturbance on Opioid Use Disorder: Implications for Disease Progression and Treatment Outcomes

SUMMARY: Chronic stress has long been associated with sleep disturbance, addiction risk, and drug relapse. However, the specific neural and biobehavioral processes by which chronic stress and sleep disturbance might interact to promote the progression of opioid use disorder (OUD) and impede OUD treatment have only recently garnered attention. In general, individuals with substance use disorders (SUD) including OUD have high rates of trauma, stress, and stress-related mood and anxiety disorders. This symposium brings together an exceptional team of experts who utilize a wide range of clinical research methodology, including human laboratory studies, brain imaging, ambulatory monitoring, and clinical trials. 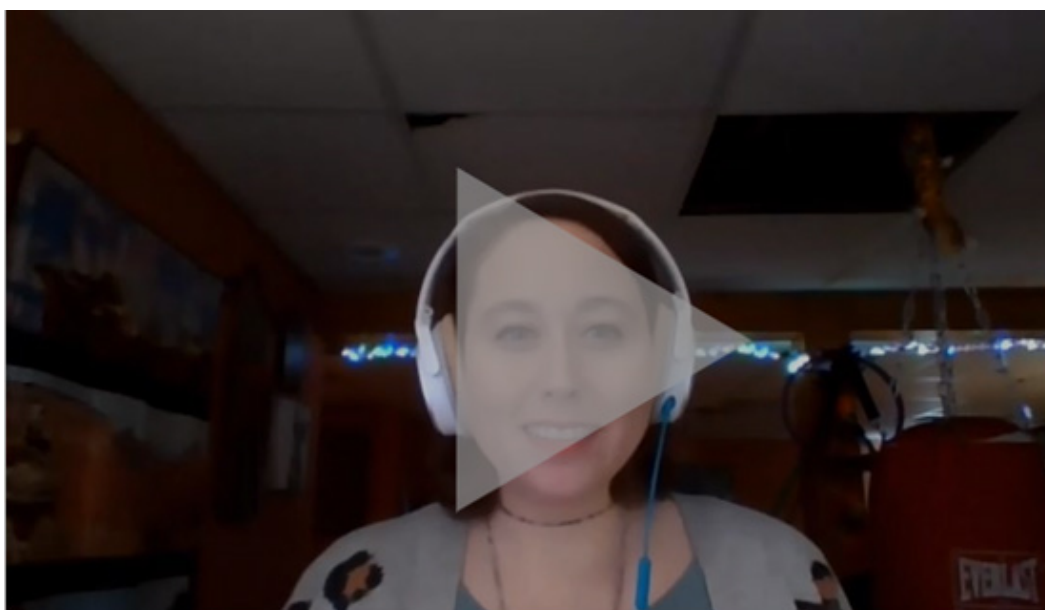

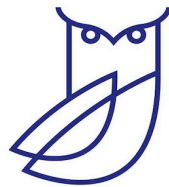
