




University of Colorado Addiction Psychiatry Fellowship Program

- Up to 3 fellows per year; 1 year fellowship
- 4 clinical sites offering range of treatment settings and patient populations
 - University of Colorado Hospital CeDAR [4 months full time] inpatient medically managed withdrawal and residential treatment
 - **Denver Health** [4 months full time] outpatient substance use d/o (SUD) clinic, opioid treatment program (methadone), addiction consult service, involuntary commitment evaluations, and adolescent SUD clinic (STEP)
 - ARTs (Addiction Research Treatment Services) [4 months half-time]-Inspiration for men residential program, opioid treatment program (methadone), adolescent SUD clinic
 - VA Medical Center and Clinics [4 months half-time] SUD clinic with outpatient withdrawal mgmt. & Community Resources and Referral Center clinic for the unhoused
 - ½ day/wk didactics attended with addiction medicine fellows

- Your Bespoke experience at OHSU involves emphasis on:
 - Longitudinal experiences
 - Most rotations are 6-12 months long (it's best to follow Pt's over time to learn about phases and vicissitudes of recovery)
 - Psychotherapy
 - Weekly classical psychodynamic supervision
 - Advanced addiction psychotherapy curriculum
 - Medically managed detox
 - In modern era of super drugs and polypharmacy—need extensive experience in acute stabilization/management
 - Metalearning
 - 4 hours of structured didactics/ week
 - Collaboration/Co-location with Addiction Medicine/Primary care/Toxicology
 - Work with Dr Stauffer (Pl at SNAP Lab-psychedelics research)





Advanced Addiction Psychotherapy Curriculum

- How much things have changed
 - Psychoanalytic psychiatry was more influential in Psychiatry up until 80s or so
 - Medications were part of psychiatric care but less of an emphasis.
 - Then Entered Biological Psychiatry
 - Many great advancements
 - Pendulum has swung big time
 - Now—unless in private practice
 - Just do med checks
 - Individual/group therapy now mostly done by SW/Psychologists



Are we missing out?
Are our patients missing out?
Is this sufficient for a fulfilling practice long term???
Is this divided care optimal care?

Reimbursement

 The medical Machine seems to be directing Psychiatrists to do mostly medication management

- But perhaps there's hope.....
 - Medicare recently started to reimburse for psychotherapy by a psychiatrist
 - Other insurances will likely follow

Residency Training

- Psychotherapy seems to have been de-emphacized in psychiatric residency training
- Might get some Psychodynamic and CBT training and very basic exposure to things like DBT, MI

Importance of a deeper understanding of psychotherapies

- Even if we don't do them ourselves
 - Knowing more about them and who they might help
 - Allows us to accurately refer
 - Can sprinkle some of the underlying principles into our med management sessions
 - One of my wisest mentors said "some psychotherapy sessions are complete in 10 minutes—the rest is just filler"

BUSM-VA ADDICTION PSYCHIATRY FELLOWSHIP

- >ACGME accredited since 1997
- >Up to 4 fellows per year for our 1-year clinical fellowship; options to continue in research
- > Clinical Excellence Rotations:
 - ➤ VA Boston Healthcare System Jamaica Plain (3 months and longitudinal) primary training site; methadone and buprenorphine treatment for patients with Opioid Use Disorder (OUD), other SUDS, and other mental health disorders (COD); opioid reassessment clinic (pain clinic); Opioid Rapid Access Clinic (ORACL)
 - > Boston Medical Center (3 months)- inpatient addiction medicine consultation; ambulatory adolescent-young adult SUD; ambulatory adult Addiction Psychiatry
 - > Bedford VA Healthcare System (3 months)- ambulatory partial hospital program and geriatric addiction treatment
 - > Brigham & Women's Hospital (3 months) inpatient addiction consult services & pregnant women
- Electives and scholarly activities: One-month elective, plus at least one half-day year long protected

Columbia University SUD Fellowship

- Combines an ACGME Addiction Psychiatry fellowship with a NIDA T32 funded SUD translational research fellowship
- A 2-year program, with 50% clinical/50% research in both years
- Research areas:
 - Behavioral pharmacology
 - Translational neuroscience
 - Medications development
 - Psychotherapy mechanisms
 - Implementation science
- Clinical rotations
 - Addiction consult service (NYP-Columbia)
 - OBOT clinic (NYSPI)
 - Inpatient rehabilitation (NYP-Cornell)
 - OTP (START Programs)
 - Day program (NYP-Columbia)

Areas of research that are relevant to AP

- Public health/epidemiology
- Clinical trials
 - Medications development

Pathways to a research career in AP

- Opportunities for research/scholarly activity during residency
 - Primary research
 - Case studies/series
 - Literature reviews
 - Secondary analyses
- Pathways during fellowship:
 - Elective experiences (most AP fellowships)
 - Formal research tracks as part of 1-year clinical fellowships
 - NIH Loan Repayment Program (>50% research)
 - NIDA or NIAAA T32/research track fellowship: additional 1-2 years, can be integrated with clinical fellowship or be done afterward
- Pathways after fellowship
 - NIDA or NIAAA K mentored career development award (typically K23 for clinicians) (4-5 years, >75% research)
 - NIDA or NIAAA R01 (5 years, variable effort, usually >20-30%)

AP fellowships with research tracks

- Mass General/Brigham: Offers a 2-year, half-clinical half-research track, depending on the fellow applicant's interest and funding in a particular year.
- NYP-Columbia University: All fellows complete an integrated T32 (research) and ACGME (clinical) fellowship over 2 years
- University of New Mexico: Has opportunities to participate in cutting edge research, including:
 - Ketamine for methamphetamine addiction
 - Psilocybin for treatment resistant depression
 - MDMA for PTSD + Opioid Use Disorder
 - TMS for PTSD and stimulant use disorders
- Vanderbilt University: One fellow/year is eligible for funding through a Tennessee Opioid Abatement Council Community Grant, the Tennessee Addiction Psychiatry Research Fellowship in Opioid Use Disorder
- Yale University: A T32 fellowship can be completed after the clinical fellowship

- 2.5 days a week for 1 year
- Substance Abuse Residential Rehabilitation Treatment Program (Inpatient)
- Dual Diagnosis Clinic treating veterans with mental health diseases and other drug use disorder.

Adolescent Center for Treatment

- 1 month
- Residential addiction treatment program
- Fellow participates with the in evaluation, development and implementation of the treatment plan, works with family members in institutional and home settings and works with juvenile justice authorities.

University of Kansas Medical Center-Interventional Pain Clinic

- 1 month
- Observe procedures as appropriate.

Children's Mercy-Eating Disorder rotation

- 1 month
- Outpatient pediatric assessment and treatment of eating disorders utilizing a multidisciplinary approach.
- Fellows shadow medical providers, psychologists, clinical licensed social workers, case conceptualization and treatment recommendations.

Up to 2 fellows per year;

- 1 year fellowship
- 4 clinical sites offering a range of treatment settings and patient populations.




International medical graduates and the Addiction Psychiatry Fellowships

International medical graduates and the Addiction Psychiatry Fellowships

- The Non-US IMG's who enter GME programs must obtain a visa that allows them to work in the medical training program.
- The two most common visa types that are temporary nonimmigrant visas are the J-1 exchange visitor and the H-1B temporary worker visa.
- As part of the J-1 Exchange visitor visa program, the IMG is required to return back to their home country for a two-year period following completion of their training.
- This provision can be waived however and is referred to as the J-1 waiver.
- One way to get the j1 waiver is through the CONRAD 30 waiver program. This is in exchange of physician's service in an underserved area that the hospital or health system belongs to for three years.





Reasons for IMG's to do Addiction fellowships

- Underserved populations in United States including the homeless, racial ethnic minorities, those retained in legal systems and others are affected by disproportionate substance use disorders.
- The IMG is able to find and potentially stay in an underserved area that he /she could work in.
- Potential to work as medical directors of Opioid Treatment Programs, Inpatient programs, IOP's and outpatient clinics.
- Potential to have j-1 waiver be sponsored in location of choice due to the demand to serve this population.
